#### Some Huguenot population figures:

- 1.5 million Huguenots in France in 1560, 10 percent of the population
- Only 500,000 Huguenots in France in 1750
- 30,000 Huguenots fled to Switzerland
- 50,000-75,000 to the United Provinces (Netherlands)
- 44,000 to German states (includes Poland)
- 40,000-50,000 fled to England – mostly London and Canterbury
- 2,000 to Russia
- 500 to Denmark
- 300 to Canada (New France)
- 300 Walloons to French West Indies (St. Kitts, Haiti, etc.)
- 2,000 to British North America
